An important message from the IMPACT team (Improving Addiction Coordination Team).

In an effort to address the current Opioid Crisis, the IMPACT was created by Monroe County Executive Adam Bello. It is understood that addiction is a disease rather than a choice. Our efforts are to respond to overdoses in Monroe County (fatal and non-fatal), providing resources to survivors and or their survivors. Team IMPACT seeks to create positive change within the Rochester community and eliminate the negative stigma associated with individuals who use opioids, while providing the tools to save lives.

In the forefront the priority is introducing NARCAN to educate community members to participate in preventing the death(s) that can occur due to an overdose episode. NARCAN is a medically approved medication in the form of a nasal spray that can interrupt the process of an overdose. Giving the individual crucial time to wait for the arrival of trained medical staff to prevent death related to the overdose.

Our efforts have also included training the community at large while placing Nalox boxes in areas throughout Monroe County. We have trained more than 500 community members on how to use NARCAN and have issued more than 50 Nalox boxes, containing 6 boxes of NARCAN, to date placed in various areas of the community.

As the overdose related episode numbers continue, we have identified the need for community efforts to continue as well. We are offering a waitlist for community agencies and businesses to be a part of the next round of Nalox box distribution. The IMPACT team is hoping that you take the offer of being listed to receive an upcoming distributed Nalox box as well as mentioned as a partner in this effort from Monroe County Public Health."

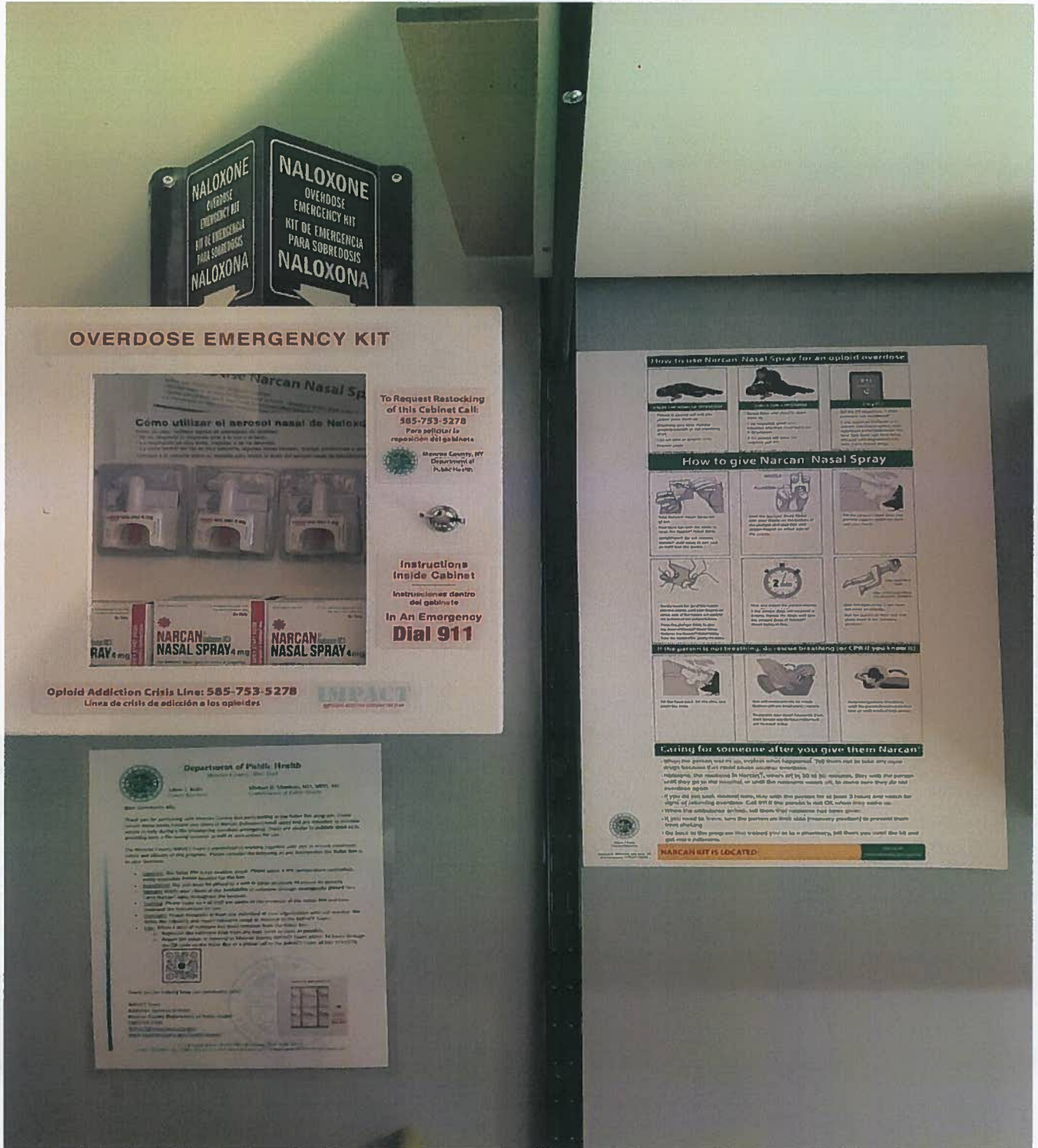

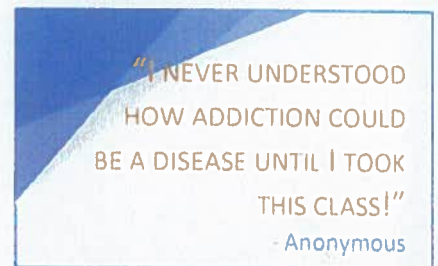

Naloxone is a medicine that rapidly **reverses** an opioid overdose. It is an **opioid antagonist**. This means that it attaches to opioid receptors and reverses and **blocks the effects** of other opioids.

Naloxone is not a substitute for emergency medical care. Always get help immediately, even if the person wakes up, because he/she may relapse into respiratory depression. The use of Naloxone may result in symptoms of acute opioid withdrawal. Results may vary.

Naloxone can quickly restore normal breathing to a person if their breathing has slowed or stopped **because of an opioid overdose**. Naloxone has **no effect** on someone who does not have opioids in their system, and it is **not** a treatment for opioid use disorder.

Dear Community Business Owner/Manager:

As you may be aware, the opioid crisis continues to affect all corners of our community. In 2017, 220 deaths occurred in Monroe County due to opioid overdose. Opioid overdoses can and do occur anywhere and at any time, including in food service establishments; in fact, it has already happened in Monroe County.

As Commissioner of Public Health I encourage you to keep a 'Nalox Box' containing Narcan at your establishment and display the Department of Public Health's new step-by-step poster for administering Narcan. Narcan is a safe and effective emergency nasal spray that can be easily administered to stop an opioid overdose. It is our goal to have Narcan more widely available in community settings so that in the event of an overdose, it can be quickly administered while 911 is being called. It truly can be the difference between life and death.

If your business does not currently have a 'Nalox Box' and or carry Narcan, the Monroe County Department of Public Health will provide one for you free of charge. As well as allowing public access to frequent trainings on the administration of Narcan. Training is free, open to the public, and each participant receives a Narcan kit.
